### INTRODUCTION

The Sentencing and Policy Advisory Commission (Sentencing Commission) prepares biennial reports evaluating the effectiveness of the State's correctional programs (N.C.G.S. § 164-47). The Sentencing Commission has published thirteen recidivism reports in compliance with this mandate; the most recent study was published on April 15, 2024.<sup>1</sup> Historically, the Sentencing Commission's research design used a sample of offenders released from prison or *placed on probation* during a fiscal year. In its most recent report (the 2024 report), a new methodology was used for the study of probationers, based on *release from or completion of probation*, rather than admission.

This report combines the prison release sample examined in the *Correctional Program Evaluation Report: Offenders Placed on Probation or Released from Prison in FY 2019* (2022) with the probation release sample examined in the *Correctional Program Evaluation Special Report: Offenders Released from Supervised Probation in FY 2019* (2022) to create a new sample using the most recent methodology. It was developed as a reference for the 2024 report to allow for comparisons between sample characteristics and outcomes, critical comparisons for understanding recidivism.




Figure 1 FY 2019 Recidivism Release Sample

The sample in this reference report includes offenders sentenced under the Structured Sentencing Act who were released from supervised probation or prison in FY 2019 (N=45,617). (*See* Figure 1.) Direct comparisons can be made to the 2024 sample, but not the previous twelve Commission studies of recidivism. Included in this document are tables and figures like those published in the 2024 report. For definitions, explanations of terms, and data caveats, please refer to the 2024 report.




Figure 2 FY 2019 Recidivism Sample




Figure 3 Sex and Race







Figure 6 Offense Category of the Sample Conviction



Figure 9 Number of Recidivist Arrests for Offenders with Any Arrest: Two-Year Follow-Up




Figure 11 Number of Recidivist Arrests by Offense Category for Offenders with Any Arrest: Two-Year Follow-Up








Figure 15 Criminal Justice Outcomes: Two-Year Follow-Up





Figure 16 Probationers by Release Reason N=30,763






Figure 20 Offense Category of the Sample Conviction



Figure 22 Actual Months Supervised






Figure 23 Risk and Need Levels







Figure 25 High Risk Delegated Authority: Probation Supervision

Figure 26 Violations: Probation Supervision







Figure 30 Nonconfinement Response Rates: Probation Supervision







Figure 31 Quick Dip Rates: Probation Supervision




Figure 33 **Recidivist Arrest Rates: Probation Supervision**




Figure 34 **Recidivist Arrest Rates: Two-Year Follow-Up**

Figure 35 Recidivist Arrest Rates by Supervision Level: Two-Year Follow-Up





Figure 36 Recidivist Arrest Rates by High Risk Delegated Authority for High Risk Probationers: Two-Year Follow-Up




Figure 37 Recidivist Arrest Rates by Violation: Two-Year Follow-Up





Figure 39 Recidivist Arrest Rates and CRV (Felons Only): Two-Year Follow-Up





Figure 41 Recidivist Arrest Rates by Probation Release Reason




Figure 43 Number of Prior Arrests for Prisoners with Any Prior Arrest





Figure 44 Offense Category of the Sample Conviction





Figure 46 Most Serious Infraction for Prisoners with Any Infraction during Incarceration



Figure 48 Criminal Justice Outcomes by Number of Prior Arrests for Prisoners: Two-Year Follow-Up








Figure 52 Criminal Justice Outcomes by Type of Prison Entry: Two-Year Follow-Up






Figure 53 Criminal Justice Outcomes for Prisoners Assigned to Select Correctional Jobs/Programs: Two-Year Follow-Up




Figure 55 Supervision Level for Prisoners Released onto PRS

Figure 57 Type of Revocation for PRS Revocation Exits






Figure 58 PRS Exit Reason by Supervision Level for Prisoners Released onto PRS


