The recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for labor or services, through the use of force, fraud, or coercion for the purpose of subjection to involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage, or slavery.

Signs of labor trafficking

Appears malnourished or abused Unfamiliar with surrounding area No control of personal documents Untreated injuries / signs of physical abuse Little to no pay / long hours Living at their place of work Made to work to pay off a debt Threats to report worker to immigration authorities
